prison dog training
program. The prison's

goal was to assist the shelter by taking dogs sanctioned to death row who, with guidance from a dog trainer, would be taught appropriate behavior by offender handlers. The objective of the program, similar to others around the nation, was to increase the adoptability of hard to

place dogs while teaching offenders valuable dog training and behavior modification skills.

Knowing at the outset that

they needed a professional dog trainer on their team prison and shelter staff chose Krystal Ellingson of Speak Dog.

The Ridge Dogs Program

was operational within just a few months and has continued to expand. This program has become a true win - win; dogs lives are spared and each gains useful training to help them


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ADOPTION | Success Stories

mostly, blind. Although this


changes our training approach a little he is still doing really well. He pays close attention to those speaking around him and really listens for cues.

neutered male, brown and black Shepherd mix. He is a sweet


dog and is doing fantastic in his training!

STRAIGHT TALK | A Trainer's Perspective

To have a balanced life living with a dog you need to have three key things; confidence, trust building, and a behavior modification.

CONFIDENCE

Confidence building is important for both the dog and their human counterparts. Without confidence the dog will always be fearful of its surroundings, and will therefore be hard to train.

BUILD TRUST

Trust building is also important because without it, the dog will not listen to you, or look up to you for protection. If the dog can't trust you to protect them from harm, then there cannot be a bond between you two.

BEHAVIOR MOD

Behavior modification is also important in helping the dog overcome their fears and bad behaviors. Once they do this, they can live a healthy and long life.

So in conclusion, to live a balanced life with a dog, it is imperative that trust building, confidence building, and behavior modification be a big part of both the human's and dog's life.
